



Jesuit response to Ukraine Crisis | 2025

"01/01/25 - 31/05/25"

The International Armed Conflict in Ukraine has caused the largest humanitarian crisis in Europe in recent history. **6.9 Millions** have been forced to flee their homes, and **3.7 millions** more remain displaced or in need in Ukraine. Upon the outbreak of this conflict, the Society of Jesus coordinated a global response through **JRS** and **Xavier Network** in Ukraine, neighboring countries, and the rest of Europe to welcome, protect, promote, and integrate those in need.





The One Proposal was present also in **Moldova** (with Concordia) and **14 countries** supported through the **Integration Fund**.




Activities overview

Challenges

The implementation of the **"One Proposal"** project took place amid a rapidly shifting humanitarian and geopolitical landscape. Several critical challenges emerged that reflect broader trends documented by leading international agencies such as **UNHCR**, **IOM**, and **WHO**.

In **2025**, one of the most significant challenges was the gradual withdrawal of government subsidies and support schemes initially designed to accommodate large-scale refugee inflows. This phenomenon was reported across several countries, including **Romania** and **Hungary**.

From these challenges, several critical lessons have emerged:

- Contextual Flexibility:** Tailoring responses to local conditions
- Integrated Programming:** Multisectoral interventions
- Community Engagement:** Ownership among beneficiaries
- Strategic Partnerships:** Collaboration and sustainability
- Resilience and Autonomy:** Empowering individuals and reduces dependency
- Advocacy and Visibility:** For Integration and social cohesion

Lidiia's Story

"FROM THE VERY BEGINNING, WE FELT WARMTH AND OPENNESS FROM THE POLISH PEOPLE. FOR THREE YEARS, WE HAVE ENCOUNTERED NOTHING BUT KINDNESS AND SUPPORT."

While looking for Polish language courses, we heard about the JRS Foundation from Ukrainians. They spoke warmly about cultural events, prayers for Ukraine, and the atmosphere of support. As soon as the opportunity arose, we signed up for the courses. They are really high quality — we are taught by experienced, empathetic teachers who understand what we have been through. It is important that the courses last for five months — this gives us a real chance to learn the language. I would like to especially thank the team and management of the JRS Foundation. They are extremely warm and open people. Their kindness and warmth really give us strength.

Meeting JRS felt indeed like a help from God, like divine providence. I've talked to many other IDPs, and few have had this kind of living conditions and respectful treatment that we receive here. Also, one of my long-held dreams came true here in Lviv: I finally heard a live organ concert in the nearby concert hall. One day, as I walked back from that concert to the JRS shelter, I caught myself thinking — I'm going home. Because for now, this is home. At the shelter, I feel accepted, valued, and cared for.
